A MOPAR Couple In Japan By: Ann and Randy Smith

It is a really long flight to Japan. ... Correction: It's a really, really, long flight to Japan. Here we are (left) just before departing IND for the 4-hour flight to LAX, followed by a 15-hour flight to HND (Tokyo's Haneda Airport), after which we boarded a bus to take a train to our dorms in Tokyo's Olympic Center. Why would anyone endure such travel? For us, it was simple. The opportunity presented itself for us to live for a month

among a vibrant and spectacular culture that has persisted for centuries longer than Europeans even knew the Americas existed. And, today Japan is one of the world's strongest capitalist economies, providing an important example for 21st Century approaches to global issues.

We found much was different in Japan. It's quieter and cleaner in Japanese large cities, even though there are many more people. Tokyo metro is about 37 million people, whereas New York metro is about 20 million people. Yet, there's never a speck of litter and no one uses their horn in Tokyo. Things were also much smaller. As an island country, Japanese are highly interested in efficiency, green technology and recycling. Space is at a premium. When we saw a Cadillac Escalade attempting to navigate the primary streets of Sendai (a city about the size of Indy), it looked like a hippopotamus attempting to get to a seat a Victory Field. Indeed, most city busses are the size of an Escalade in Japan and we saw RVs that were smaller. To put size into perspective, we stayed one night in a pretty fancy hotel. Our "double room" included a double bed (not a

queen) and lying flat on the bed, arms extended overhead, Randy would be touching two walls at the widest point of the room. And if Randy lay that way in the opposite direction, we'd need to open the windows to extend his arms. Religion is different. There are Shinto Shrines and Buddhist Temples around every corner

Interestingly, though Japanese take their religion and philosophy and incorporate it into the core of their daily life rather than make an external thing that they touch-base with on a regular and visible basis.



Food is also different, though there are entire books on that culture. Suffice it to say that we tasted some of the best food of our lives in Japan, and some that we could go without tasting (or food consistencies that we'd

prefer to avoid) for the remainder of our days.

There is an interesting car culture in Japan. Unlike what we've been lead to believe by Hollywood, drift cars and boyracer machines were few and far between. Most vehicles were obviously designed with function in mind, and most were spotless. Everyone parks backwards in their driveway and you see very few cars with rust or damage on the road. We had opportunity to sit in a NISMO modified Nissan GTR in the showroom, and saw a 1958 Subaru 360 roped off as a treasure at a multi-generational sake and beer brewery. We observed a



classic Aston Martin V8 Vantage on a wrecker and supercars like the Lamborghini Aventador and Ferrari 488 GTB roaming the streets. With all of the talk of FCA US running into difficulties marketing MOPARs outside of North America, we wondered if we would see any during our month in Japan. It turns out, we did! As you



might expect, most of what we saw were Jeeps. Most often we saw TJs and XJs. We caught an XJ stopped at the busiest intersection in the world, Shibuya Crossing (above right). Note the size of the XJ Unlimmited next to the



typical delivery van in Tokyo. We also came across a Jeep Compass along the Nara Deer Park near the Daibatsu located in Tōdai-ji (left). And a Jeep Renegade within the heart of Kyoto (right). Yet, we saw more than just the Jeep brand. We caught glimpse of a Durango Citadel (below left) near the Tsukigi Fish Market in Tokyo. Note how large the Durango looks in comparison to the commercial truck. This truck is about the



MOPAR that really boggled Randy's mind was the Chrysler Ypsilon (a rebrand of a Lancia by the same name) we saw in Kyoto (pictured right).



The LX platform also lurked in Japan. It popped up when we least expected it, disobeying all Japanese conventional cultural standards. Out of nowhere this Challenger (left) emerged, rumbling and unassuming, from a pre-rush-hour Shibuya Crossing. It emitted a little growl with its turn. Unfortunately, as with any good fish (or car) story, the one that got away (or in this case evaded the camera) was the most impressive. We were on our way to the Tokyo Park Hyatt to grab a quick beverage from the bar atop the hotel. (The bar was made famous in the movie Lost in Translation, starring Bill Murray and Scarlett Johansson.) As we walked through



the quiet and relatively empty after-business-hours streets of Shinjukyu Ku, the silence was torn apart by a 300 SRT with an exhaust and many other modifications. It roared down Nishishinjuku as the rasp of the exhaust echoed down the street. Everyone on the street stopped and turned to see what was wrong. Randy just smiled. Japan is an amazing place to visit. While we stood out like sore thumbs (especially Randy), in this country where foreigners are few and far between, we were welcomed wherever we went, whether it be

the Cup Noodle Museum in Yokohama (below left), a Sumo Match in Tokyo (below center), or the magnificent Kinkaku-ji Temple in Kyoto (below right). This was even the case in Hiroshima, where we met with a survivor of the atomic bomb. The bomb survivor was more concerned that we bring home her story to ensure that no one should have to go through what she did, than she was concerned that we were citizens of the country that dropped the bomb (We will share her story, if you're interested). We also found most of the large cities relatively easy to navigate, especially Tokyo. Anyone with a bit of travel savvy can likely make it around Tokyo. And, the rest of the country is a short train-ride away.







By far the fastest vehicle we saw on the ground was the Shinkansen (Bullet Train). Traversing the country at 180+ mph really made for exceptional travel. Imagine going from Indy to Chicago in just over an hour! No

airport, no security, just board the train at the <u>exact</u> time it is supposed to be there (<u>early or late departure is not tolerated</u>). The best part is that the seats are easily twice as big as any commercial airliner, downright roomy. And, the ride was as smooth as silk. This is how we connected to cities all across the country. It made for quick and convenient travel. Japan has a highly developed and efficient railroad system. All we had to do was walk to the nearest train station, and we could access pretty much the entire country. Oh, and did we mention that the only luggage we carried <u>for the entire month</u>, was one backpack the size of a carry-on and another slightly smaller than what your kids (or grandkids) carry to school? ... Perhaps that's a discussion for another Member Profile. Sayōnara!
